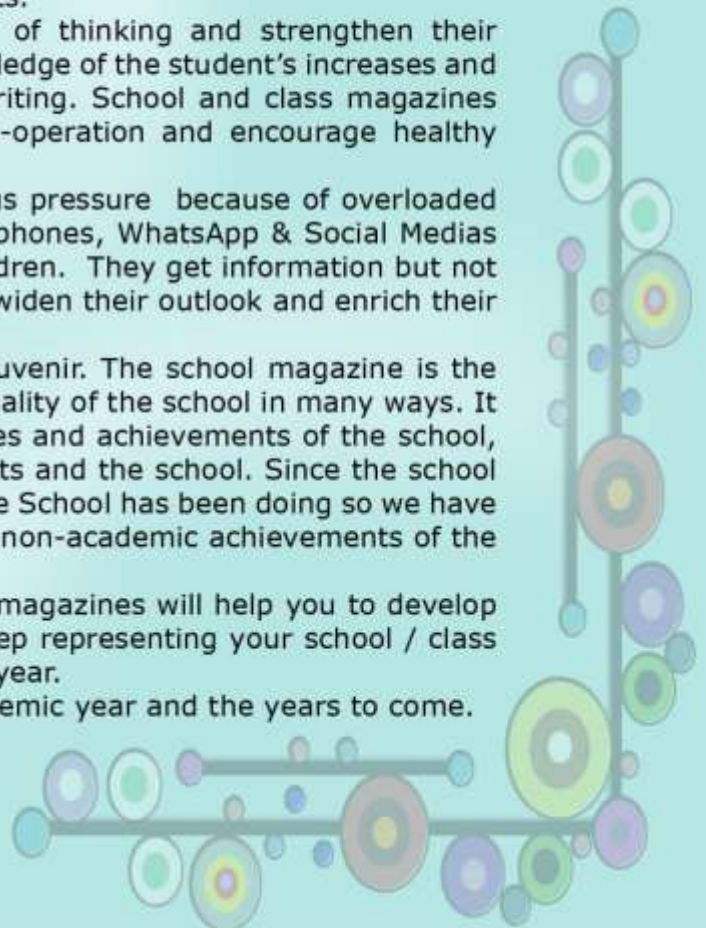

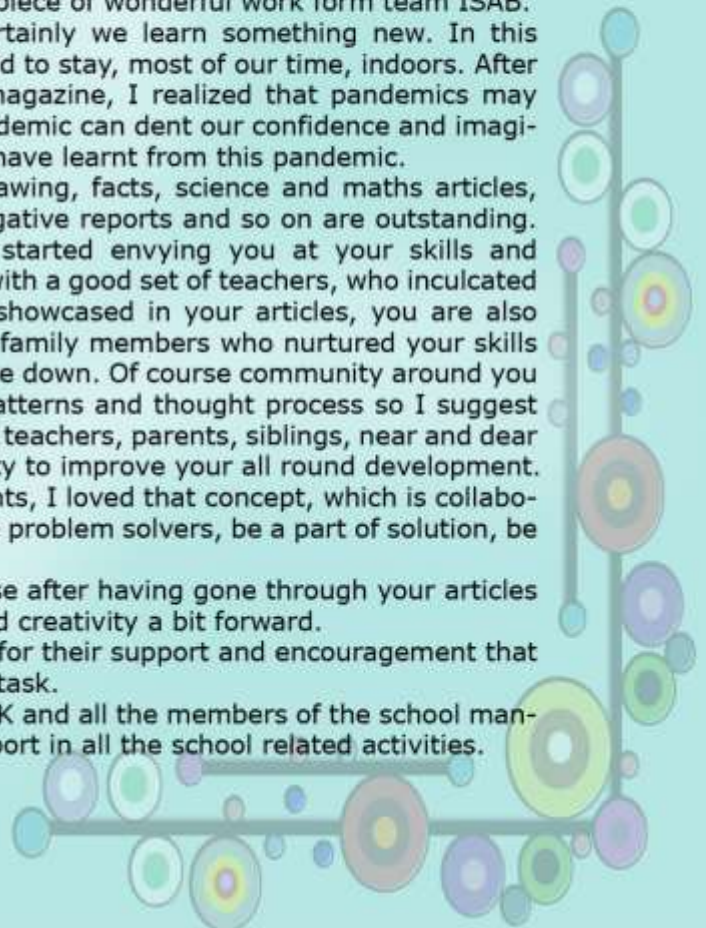

## 2020-The Worst Year In History!

May- Humans lose their humanity as seen on May 25, 2020, George Floyd, a 46-year-old black American man, was killed in Minneapolis, Minnesota, during an arrest for allegedly using a counterfeit bill. Derek Chauvin, a white police officer, knelt on Floyd's neck for almost eight minutes while Floyd was handcuffed and lying face down, begging for his life and repeatedly saying "I can't breathe". Officers J. Alexander Kueng and Thomas Lane further restrained Floyd, while officer Tou Thao prevented bystanders from intervening. During the final two minutes, Floyd was motionless and had no pulse while Chauvin ignored onlookers' pleas to remove his knee, which he did not do until medics told him to. Then when the video went viral on the internet people thought of doing something and then started a protest of black lives matter.

June- well so far there are many disasters that occurred in all the months gone by; there are even many disasters that also happened in June

July- there were 110 miners killed in landslide at a jade mine in state of Kachin, northern Myanmar. Numerous environmental disasters occurred across the world in the month of July, which included forest fires in Ukraine, a storm in Russia, landslides in Myanmar, Nepal, China and many flash floods caused by heavy rains.

August-On 27 July 2020, explosions and exchange of fire were heard during a "security incident" at the border between the Israeli-occupied Golan Heights and Lebanon. President Michel Aoun said the blast was, caused by 2,750 tons of ammonium nitrate stored unsafely in a warehouse. All port officials have been, put under house arrest pending an investigation.

## *The Evolution of Computers*

Everyone says that Charles Babbage is the father of computing. What does that MEAN?

The device that Babbage actually invented is known as a "Difference Engine". A difference engine is like an oversized calculator designed to solve simple polynomial functions.

Here's what it looked like back in the 1837 (yes, two centuries ago):



Ada Lovelace met Charles Babbage at a ball long before he was the "Father of Computing". Both Charles and Ada shared an interest in Mathematics and became fast friends. One day, Charles invited Ada to see his, at that time, newly built Difference Engine. Ada was fascinated by it. Ada's notes suggested that she understood how to make Charles' invention do what modern computers do.

In 1944 (76 years ago), Harvard University's developer, Howard Aiken, released one of the first computers in the world. This computer was dubbed Mark I. Mark I was used in the war effort in the last part of World War II.

Grace Hopper was one of the first programmers of Mark I. Hopper spread the idea of programming languages that can be run on any machine which led to the development of COBOL

(Common Business Oriented Language). She also developed validation software for COBOL and its compiler as part of a COBOL standardization program for the entire Navy when she was promoted to the rank of Captain in the Navy's Office of Information Systems Planning in 1973.

Computer Programming played an important role in ending World War II. Alan Turing, known as the

Father of Modern Computer Science, discovered the concepts of computations and algorithms with

his inventions. He developed a machine to decode the Enigma Machine, an encryption device used by the Nazis in World War II, as he believed that only a machine can compete with another machine. This shortened World War II by two years and saved countless lives.

What is a Chatbot?

A chatbot is a program that takes input from the user and replies intelligently using human text. The first chatbot in the world is the ELIZA chatbot. The ELIZA chatbot was developed in 1966 at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology (MIT). According to the Turing Test, ELIZA was intelligent. It was successful by looking for patterns and giving related responses.

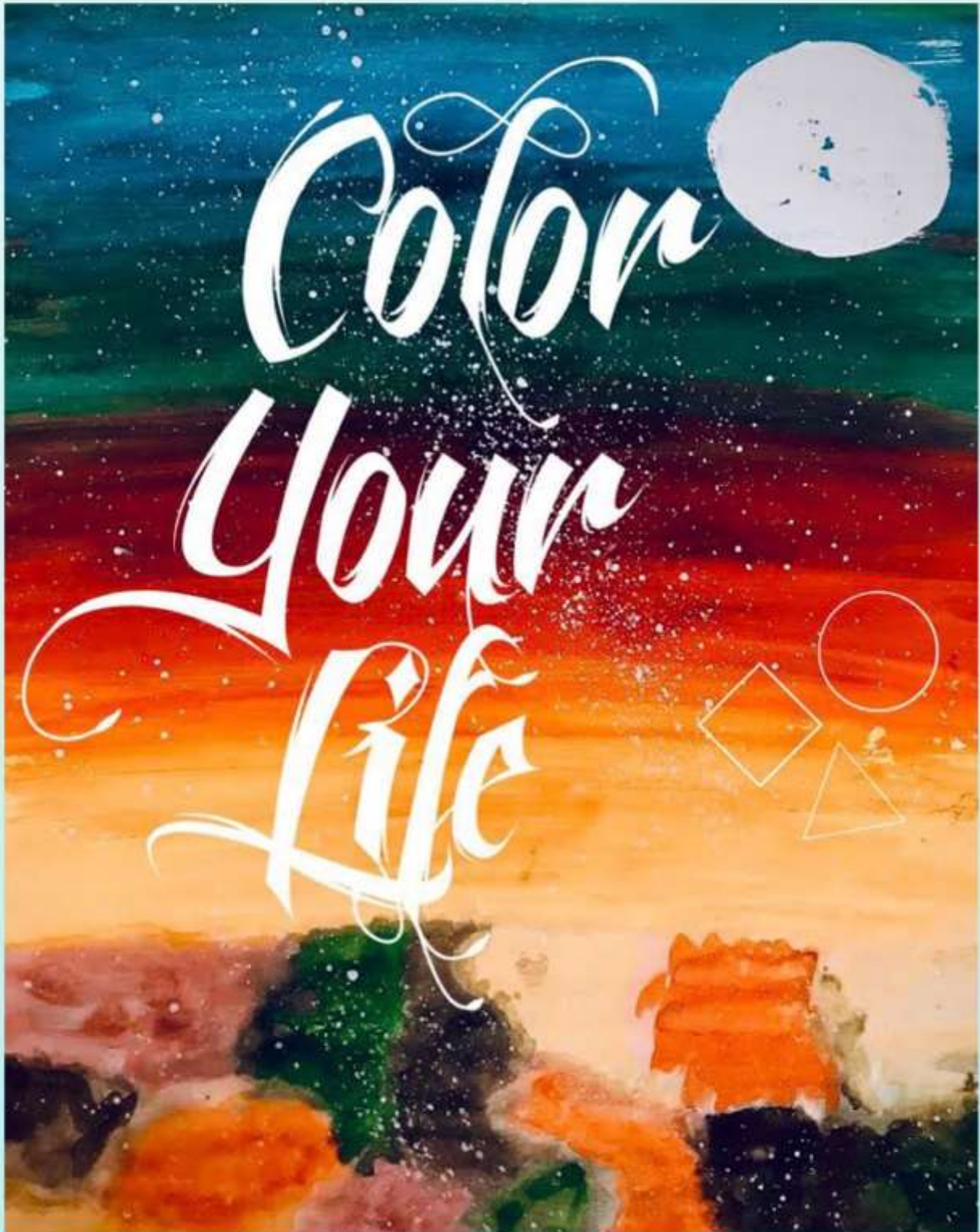
The Significance of Computers in our Lives Today:

## Why COVID-19 is not new

Pandemics like COVID-19 are not new, there have been many in the past, Even in the modern era. Such as:-

- HIV/AIDS Pandemic (Peak 2005-2012)
- Flu Pandemic (1968)
- Spanish Flu (1918-1920)
- Cholera Pandemic (1910-1911)

### 1. HIV/AIDS

Death Toll: 3,60,00,000

Cause: HIV/AIDS

HIV was first identified in the Democratic Republic of the Congo in 1976. Killing more than 3 crore people since 1981. Currently there are between 3,10,00,000 and 3,50,00,000 people infected with HIV, Most of them living in Sub-Saharan Africa. Since its founding, new treatments have been developed to make HIV far more manageable and allow the infected to lead productive lives.

### 2. Flu Pandemic

Death Toll: 10,00,000

Cause: Influenza (H3N2)

The 1968 Flu pandemic was a Class 2 flu pandemic

also referred to as the Hong Kong Flu. Caused by the H3N2 strain of Influenza A. The first case was reported in Hong Kong on July 12 1968 hence the name. It only took 17 days before outbreaks were reported in Singapore and Vietnam. Within 3 months it spread to Australia, The Philippines, India, Europe and the United States. It had a mortality rate of 5% which is quite low but killed 5,00,000 in Hong Kong alone.



### 3. Spanish Flu

Death Toll: 2,00,00,000-5,00,00,000

Cause: Influenza

During World War 1. From 1918-1920, A new virus emerged which tore across the world. It began in the United States. But with war-time censorship, Not much was known about it. Only when it jumped to Spain which was neutral did people know about it hence the name Spanish Flu. This was a pandemic that resembles COVID-19 with face mask regulations, social distancing, and quarantines. But it was also much more deadly than COVID-19. Some cities ran out of coffins to bury the dead, forcing them to use mass graves. What separated the 1918 flu pandemic from other influenza outbreaks was the victims; where influenza had always previously only killed juveniles and the elderly or already weakened patients, it had begun striking down hardy and completely healthy young adults, while leaving children and those with weaker immune systems still alive.

### 4. The Cholera Pandemic

Death Toll: 8,00,000+

Cause: Cholera

The cholera pandemic also the Sixth Cholera Pandemic due to it being the sixth and most modern incarnation. It began In India where it killed over 8,00,000.

### LEPROSY, 11th CENTURY.

THOUGH LEPROSY HAD BEEN AROUND FOR AGES, LEPROSY GREW INTO A PANDEMIC IN EUROPE IN THE MIDDLE AGES. A SLOW DEVELOPING BACTERIAL DISEASE THAT CAUSES SORES AND DEFORMITIES, LEPROSY WAS BELIEVED TO BE A PUNISHMENT FROM GOD THAT RAN IN FAMILIES



### BLACK DEATH, 1350.

THE BLACK DEATH HAUNTS THE WORLD AS THE WORST-CASE SCENARIO FOR THE SPEED OF DISEASES SPREAD. IT WAS THE SECOND PANDEMIC CAUSED DUE TO THE BUBONIC PLAGUE AND RAVAGED THE EARTH'S POPULATION. CALLED THE GREAT MORTALITY AS IT CAUSED ITS DEVASTATION, IT BECAME KNOWN AS THE BLACK DEATH IN THE LATE 17th CENTURY.

### THE GREAT PLAGUE OF LONDON, 1665.

IN ANOTHER DEVASTATING APPEARANCE, THE BUBONIC PLAGUE LED TO THE DEATHS OF 20 PERCENT OF LONDON'S POPULATION. THE WORST OF THE OUT BREAK TAPERED OFF IN THE FALL OF 1666, AROUND THE SAME TIME AS ANOTHER DESTRUCTIVE EVENT THE GREAT FIRE OF LONDON.





# PANDEMICS IN HISTORY

## **CHOLERA, 1817**

THE FIRST OF SEVEN CHOLERA PANDEMICS OVER THE NEXT 150 YEARS, THIS WAVE OF THE SMALL INTESTINE INFECTION ORIGINATED IN RUSSIA, WHERE ONE MILLION PEOPLE DIED. SPREADING THROUGH FECES-INFECTED WATER AND FOOD, THE BACTERIUM WAS PASSED ALONG TO BRITISH SOLDIERS WHO BROUGHT IT TO INDIA WHERE MILLIONS MORE DIED.



## **RUSSIAN FLU, 1889**

THE FIRST SIGNIFICANT FLU PANDEMIC STARTED IN SIBERIA AND KAZAKHSTAN, TRAVELED TO MOSCOW, AND MADE ITS WAY INTO FINLAND AND THEN POLAND, WHERE IT MOVED INTO THE REST OF EUROPE. BY THE END OF 1890, 360,000 HAD DIED.

## **SPANISH FLU, 1918 .**

THE AVIAN-BORNE FLU THAT RESULTED IN 50 MILLION DEATHS WORLDWIDE, THE 1918 FLU WAS FIRST OBSERVED IN EUROPE, THE UNITED STATES AND PARTS OF ASIA BEFORE SPREADING AROUND THE WORLD. AT THE TIME, THERE WERE NO EFFECTIVE DRUGS OR VACCINES TO TREAT THIS KILLER FLU STRAIN.



## **ASIAN FLU, 1957**

STARTING IN HONG KONG AND SPREADING THROUGHOUT CHINA AND THEN INTO THE UNITED STATES, THE ASIAN FLU BECAME WIDESPREAD IN ENGLAND WHERE, OVER SIX MONTHS, 14,000 PEOPLE DIED. A SECOND WAVE FOLLOWED IN EARLY 1958, CAUSING ABOUT 1.1 MILLION DEATHS GLOBALLY, WITH 116,000 DEATHS IN THE UNITED STATES ALONE.



# PANDEMICS IN HISTORY

## HIV/AIDS, 1981

FIRST IDENTIFIED IN 1981, AIDS DESTROYS A PERSON'S IMMUNE SYSTEM, RESULTING IN EVENTUAL DEATH BY DISEASES THAT THE BODY WOULD USUALLY FIGHT OFF. AIDS WAS FIRST OBSERVED IN AMERICAN GAY COMMUNITIES BUT IS BELIEVED TO HAVE DEVELOPED FROM A CHIMPANZEE VIRUS FROM WEST AFRICA IN THE 1920S. TREATMENTS HAVE BEEN DEVELOPED TO SLOW THE PROGRESS OF THE DISEASE, BUT 35 MILLION PEOPLE HAVE DIED OF AIDS

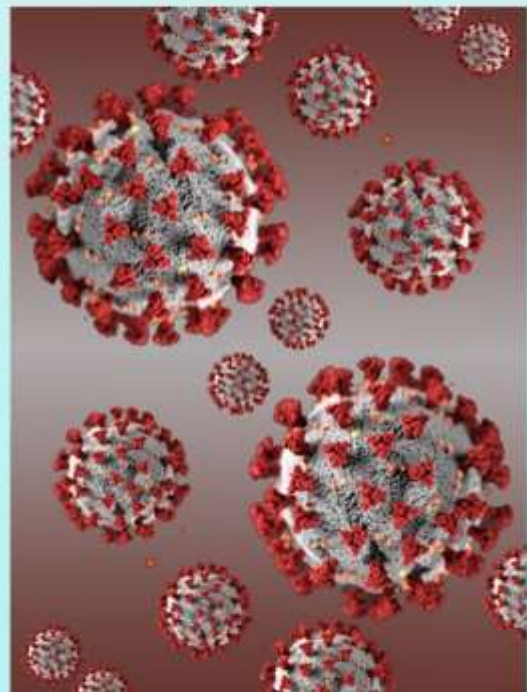


## SARS, 2003 FIRST IDENTIFIED IN 2003

SEVERE ACUTE RESPIRATORY SYNDROME IS BELIEVED TO HAVE STARTED SPREAD TO CATS AND THEN TO HUMANS IN CHINA, FOLLOWED BY 26 OTHER COUNTRIES, INFECTING 8,096 PEOPLE, WITH 774 DEATHS.

## CORONA VIRUS 2020

CORONAVIRUSES ARE A GROUP OF RELATED RNA VIRUSES THAT CAUSE DISEASES IN MAMMALS AND BIRDS. IN HUMANS AND BIRDS, THEY CAUSE RESPIRATORY TRACT INFECTIONS THAT CAN RANGE FROM MILD TO LETHAL. MILD ILLNESSES IN HUMANS INCLUDE SOME CASES OF THE COMMON COLD (WHICH IS ALSO CAUSED BY OTHER VIRUSES, PREDOMINANTLY RHINOVIRUSES), WHILE MORE LETHAL VARIETIES CAN CAUSE SARS, MERS, AND COVID-19. IN COWS AND PIGS THEY CAUSE DIARRHEA, WHILE IN MICE THEY CAUSE HEPATITIS AND ENCEPHALOMYELITIS. THERE ARE AS YET NO VACCINES OR ANTIVIRAL DRUGS TO PREVENT OR TREAT HUMAN CORONAVIRUS INFECTIONS.

Here are some suggestions:

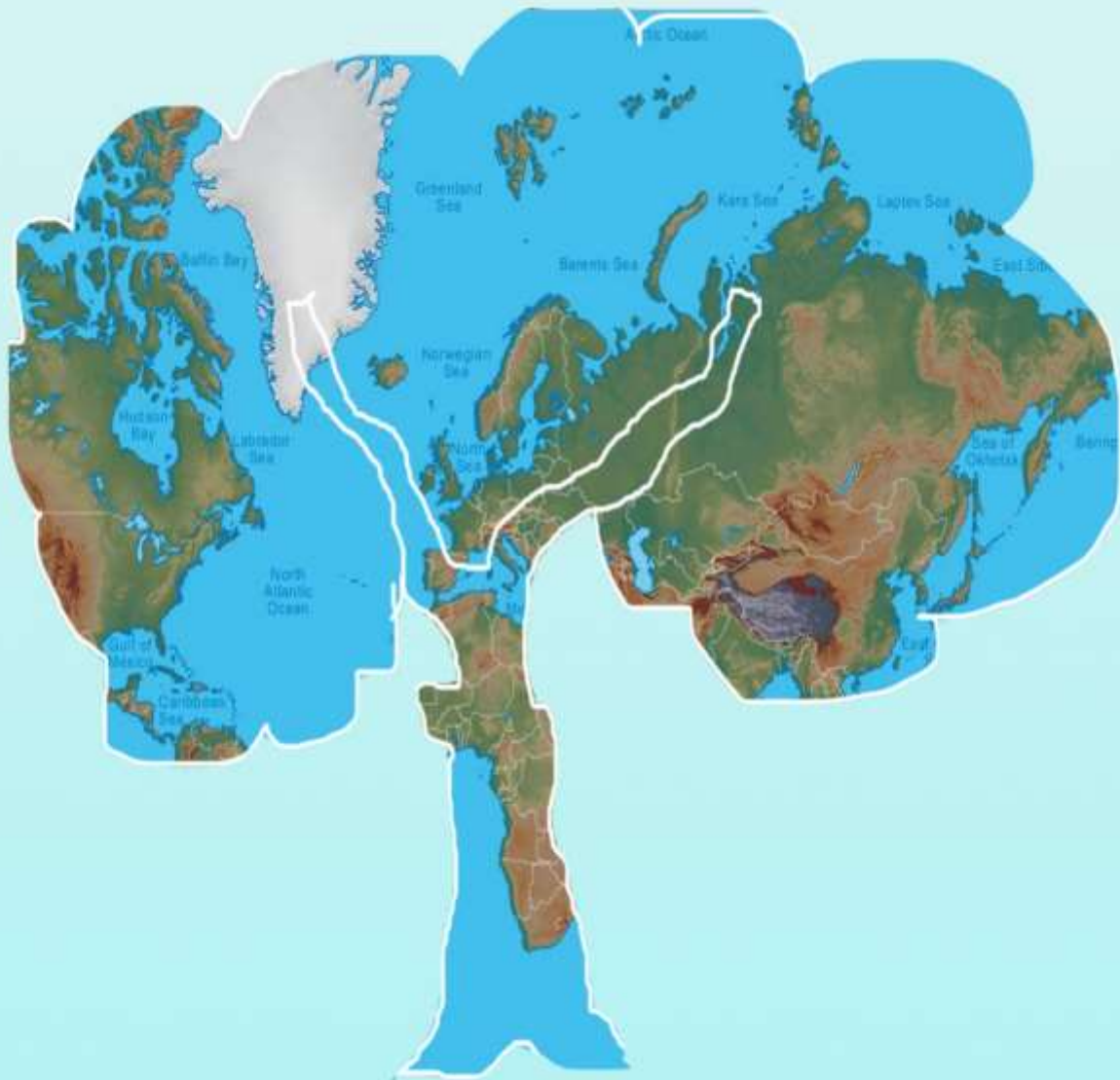

## *BLACK LIVES MATTER*

In the United States and many other countries around the world, people are protesting against the mistreatment of Black people, especially by (mostly white) police officers, whose job is to serve and protect them.

Hundreds of thousands of people in the US and around the world are going into the streets holding signs and marching to raise awareness of the problems faced by people in the Black community. For many decades, Black people have been treated unfairly compared with people of European descent and others. Often they have not been given the same advantages—for instance, not hired for jobs or unfairly harassed.



Time and again, Black people have protested this unfair treatment. While there have been some improved changes and accountability in policing, there continue to be many challenges. While Black Lives Matter can primarily be understood as a decentralized social movement, an organization known simply as Black Lives Matter exists as a decentralized network with about 16 chapters in the United States and Canada. The broader movement and its related organizations typically advocate against police violence towards black people, as well as for various other policy changes considered to be related to black liberation.

Then on May 25, a Black man named George Floyd was killed by police officers in Minneapolis, Minnesota. They were arresting him for a relatively minor alleged offense. He did not deserve the treatment he got and he did not deserve to die.

Because it was caught on video, everyone around the world saw the brutally unfair treatment of Floyd at the hands of the police. After Floyd's death, as well as other recent racist incidents (in the US and other countries including Canada) many protests took place. Hundreds of thousands of people in many countries have marched to raise awareness about racism against Black people and the need to find a solution.

Many protesters use the slogan "Black Lives Matter." (A slogan is a phrase)
